PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE OCTOBER 2021

Dear Parishioners,

You are always welcome to attend PC meetings - our next meeting will be on 23rd November 2021.

Flooding in the village - the PC is in ongoing communication with Yorkshire Water who, it seems, reduced the flushing of the drains to every 2 months without any notice. We are attempting to engage with Yorkshire Water to resolve the issue and promote drain maintenance so as to avoid flooding which so many villagers know can be a problem.

Overhanging branches which block or impede the public footpaths and roads. This was raised in the last Village Newsletter. Some villagers have already remedied the problem and cut back overhanging growth - thank you to those who have done this. However, some have not yet attended to the matter. Please would those who have gardens which impede the footpath and/or roads cut back the offending overhanging plants? This is so important for everyone so that we can all exercise a right of way over the footpaths and roads.

The PC appreciates that people are working and are busy and may not have yet found time to attend to the problem outside their house - if that applies to you we would be very grateful if you could deal with the problem now. Thanks in advance.

Parking on the Village Green. This is another issue that arises from time to time. Parking on the Village Green - which includes the grass verges in most of the village is simply not permitted. There are a number of reasons for this:

- 1) People who park repeatedly may, if left to park day after day and year after year accrue rights over the land (in other words end up adding the verge to their own property!). Clearly this cannot be allowed to happen otherwise residents end up with land that they have not paid for which belongs to everybody else!
- 2) People who park repeatedly on the village green / grass verges actually damage the village green and cause it to become mud where it should be grass etc etc. That is unacceptable when the village green is for all of us - and for the enjoyment of all.
- 3) In the past the PC has asked / reminded various residents NOT to park on the grass verges. The residents have all complied with the request - for which we are grateful. It is therefore simply not fair if other people now park on the green and continue to do so. Please stop parking on the village green / grass verges. If you see someone who is parking on the village green / grass verges please ask them not to - it is just not cricket!

FUNDING APPROVED FOR NEW CRICKET NETS FACILITY AT RAINTON CRICKET CLUB

Adults and children at Rainton Cricket Club in North Yorkshire are set to get some fabulous new practice facilities thanks to a £26,315 grant from FCC Communities Foundation.

The money will be used to provide a new double bay full length cricket practice net facility at the cricket club.

Don Wright, Chairman at Rainton CC, believes the facility will make a huge difference to the lives of people living in the area.

He says: "This project will provide a real boost to the people of Rainton and surrounding villages. The club has three adult teams and a rapidly growing junior section who will all benefit from these fabulous new facilities. It's fantastic that FCC Communities Foundation has awarded us this money and we're really looking forward to our new practice net facility taking shape and being in place early next season"

Head of the Rainton CC junior section Pete Keighley said "The existing old net facility was no longer fit for purpose and with a rapidly growing junior section we felt that the next step in the club's development should be to have much improved net practice facilities. There is huge excitement that we will now be able to push ahead and I am thrilled that FCC Communities Foundation is supporting us so strongly to enable us to do this."

FCC Communities Foundation is a not-for-profit business that awards grants for community projects through the Landfill Communities Fund.

FCC Communities Foundation spokesperson Cheryl Raynor said "We are delighted to be supporting the improvements at the club. THE GARDENER'S DIARY With Martin Fish

Autumn is definitely with us now and although it's the end of another gardening season, there is still plenty to see and be getting on with in the garden. In fact, in many ways, autumn is the start of the gardening year and the perfect time to plan ahead, prepare the garden and plant a wide selection of trees, shrubs, perennials and bulbs.

As you clear annual plants, the tops of perennials and old vegetables, put all this garden waste to good use by composting it. Ideally chop the waste and mix it in the compost bin with autumn leaves and grass cuttings to rot down.

Keep trimming the lawn to prevent it getting long and tufty and to keep it tidy. To help build up the lawn for winter, now is a good time to apply an autumn lawn feed that thickens up the grass and strengthens it for winter.

Carry on planting bulbs such as daffodils, crocus, iris, snowdrops and hyacinths into the garden and pots for a spring display. Tulips can wait until November when the soil is cooler.

Make sure evergreen hedges have been given their final trim of the year before the weather turns cold and frosty.

Finish planting spring cabbage plants and overwintering onions out into prepared soil in the garden.

Plant garlic cloves directly into the garden in well prepared soil. Plant approx. 6 inches apart with the tip of the clove 1 inch below the surface.

Lift main crop potatoes from the garden and allow the tubers to dry before storing in a dark, cool place over winter.

Harvest the last of the apples from the garden and if you intend to store them for winter use, only store fruits free from blemished and bruises.
